Fun with words – Meanings in Context

beseech = request for help

gentle = kind and tender

quarter = one fourth

trumpet = make a loud noise by blowing out air through an elephant's trunk

wrinkled = marked with lines or creases

Tidbit – Helpful Hint

> Example of Gods with the outward appearance of an animal are: the Egyptian God Anubis, who is pictured as a Jackal, or with the head of a Jackal and the body of a Man, and the Egyptian God Horus who is pictured as a Hawk or with the head of a Hawk and the body of a Man. Many cultures, such as the indigenous peoples of North and South America and the Aborigines of Australia, worship Gods who are depicted as part Human and part animal in appearance.
